LIBERTY VETERANS' CEMETERY



Burials at Liberty Cemetery started in 1896 with the Council of the Administration of Atlanta Post 92, Grand Army of the Republic with the purchase of a lot for veterans' burials. In 1911 or 1912 additional property was obtained to the west of the original lot. In 1916 the southwest portion was donated for burial of Spanish-American War graves. In 1918 land was donated north of the existing GAR property. On May 30, 1918, Liberty Cemetery was opened on Memorial Day, May 30, 1918. On May 30, 2018, a monument was dedicated for the first one hundred years of Liberty Cemetery.

DID YOU KNOW – Perhaps you have heard about the name changes that occurred at Ellis Island in New York. Many immigrants came looking for a new life. As the story goes if the Immigration inspector couldn't pronounce or spell the immigrants name it was changed. This story came along to fill in blanks in the family stories. Immigration inspectors did not change names unless it was specifically requested by the immigrant. Many of the immigration employees were immigrants themselves and often spoke several languages. These employees were assigned to groups whose language they knew. Ellis Island also had many translators to support immigration processing.

The 1890 Census

We have discussed in a previous newsletter the loss of the 1890 census in a fire. I worked on filling in some of the blanks for the 1890 census using other sources. I have been reviewing the 1880 and the 1900 census for my Great Grandfather Benjamin David Riley. I have also looked at the Kansas State census dated March 1, 1895. Every census asks different questions, so I just kept looking through all the information available to determine where and when. My most invaluable resource is the Riley family bible which began with Benjamin's father William Riley and continues to this day. I do not write in the bible as its fragile, so I now use a notebook. Sometimes not all information is available such as a street address in Beatie Kansas where they were living. Richland Kansas is primarily farmland so perhaps he was farming in 1900. This was an interesting exercise and certainly some speculation is involved but sometimes the research is interesting.

Benjamin Riley was born 25, October 1857 in Crawford Missouri. His wife's name was Perlina Ann (Lina) Powell, was born in Missouri 11, November 1861. In 1934 they were living in Fresno California near their youngest son Ray Riley, my grandfather.
